# UPDATE: WORKFORCE AND LIFE DEVELOPMENT

This year, Friends of Guest House launched the Workforce and Life Development Program. The program offers a wide variety of classes that incorporate a balance of workforce development, life skills and recreation. Classes include resume writing, interviewing skills, healthy relationships, financial literacy, career exploration and legal education.

Graduates will obtain career-focused employment with a livable wage to support themselves and their families. For those returning from incarceration, achieving financial security through long-term, sustainable employment is a proven cornerstone of reentry success.

We are working with employers to give our women jobs, internships or shadowing opportunities. Our employer partners include: Your Dog's Best Friends, AlphaGraphics Old Town and Grand Hyatt Place DC.

In an important expansion, clients in our Residential Program can now stay for up to six months—as opposed to the previous maximum of three. The longer stay gives clients the opportunity to take more personal development classes, pursue workforce development skills, explore career opportunities and save money in preparation for their transition to independent living in the Aftercare Program.



Thanks to our many community partners that provide outstanding services to our residents. Back on My Feet is one such partner. Back on My Feet volunteers meet interested Residential clients for early morning (5:45 a.m.) walks or runs, three days a week. As Chair, his goals for Guest House include: (1) expanding to accommodate and support the nearly 400 women who apply annually for the 52 beds available in the residential program, and (2) increasing awareness of Guest House and its best practices for female

Neil retired from Booz Allen Hamilton as Senior Partner after 29 years specializing in the defense sector. In 2009, the Society of Women Engineers presented to Neil the Harvey Chipp Award for "diversity demonstrated by a business leader": he was Booz Allen's first recipient of that

Neil currently also serves on the Boards of Carpenter's Shelter and The Men's Home, the latter serving recovering alcoholics.

Neil graduated from the U.S. Naval Academy in 1977 with a degree in Oceanography. He served as a Surface Warfare Officer from 1977 to 1982 and was in the Naval Reserves from 1982 to 1997, when he retired as a commander.

The Friends of Guest House Aftercare Program, like the Residential Program, has seen a lot of changes this year. It is truly a blessing to watch our women thrive in the community.

Our biggest addition is our flagship Second Chance Community. We secured a beautiful home in the West End section of Alexandria, which provides safe, affordable housing

for aftercare clients. The Second Chance Community gives more women the opportunity to stay in Northern

Virginia and continue to rebuild their lives. We plan to establish more such communities in the near future, so great is the need.

We'd like to thank all the local businesses that provide resources to our Aftercare clients. For example, Mara Benner, owner of Four Directions Wellness, offers holistic healing services to several of our clients through the Reiki Certification Program.

Community support—coupled with affordable housing, stable incomes and healthcare-allow Aftercare women to truly change their lives. All that hard work of change is recognized at our annual Aftercare Graduation. This year's graduation will be on Saturday, October 21.

Jobs, affordable housing, training, childcare, healthcare and other essential services are spread out all over Northern Virginia; and it's a big region. To reach them, our women often take several buses and make multiple transfers on Metro, which are not only time consuming but very expensive for reentering women getting back on their feet.

Recognizing the problem, Kris Keydel made a generous donation of \$5,000 to our Transportation Fund. Today, Guest House clients can draw on the Fund for Metro and bus fare as well as group transportation as needed and emergency transportation when public transit is impractical.

## HOUSE REPAIRS

On April 5, 2017, Friends of Guest House participated in Spring2ACTion: ACT for Alexandria's annual online fundraiser. Generous donors contributed more than \$32,000! Those funds were to help replace the siding and make other structural repairs to our nearly 100-year-old house. "Alexandria truly is an extraordinary city," said Executive Director Kari Galloway, "and we are so grateful to be a part of this community and part of ACT's family of grantees!"

At this writing, we have completed siding repairs and replacements. The House, an "iconic" yellow for so many years, is now a cool and comforting gray. Porch repairs are scheduled to be completed this fall.

### TAKING FEMALE MASS INCARCERATION HEAD ON

According to "Mass Incarceration and its Impacts are Devastating to Women," a blog post from the Vera Institute by Charmaine Davis, "The pathways through which women enter the justice system are different from those of men. Women entering prisons and jails are much more likely to have experienced poverty, intimate partner violence, sexual abuse, or other forms of victimization..."

Guest House is committed to providing services tailored to the unique needs of women returning to the community. Guest House provides direct services and referrals to address the root causes of female incarceration.

For example, all residents participate in the "Seeking Safety" group. "Seeking Safety" addresses both trauma and addiction and provides clients with safe coping skills and tools. These skills and tools, coupled with many additional tailored support services, give Friends of Guest House program graduates the ability to successfully return to their communities. As a result, program graduates have a recidivism rate of less than 10%, well below the national average of 70%.
